About Busch Gardens Williamsburg

A Brief History:

Busch Gardens Williamsburg opened in James City County, VA under the operation of Anheuser-Busch in 1975 under the name *Busch Gardens: The Old Country*. In 2009, the park was sold to the Blackstone Group along with Busch Gardens Tampa Bay and SeaWorld parks and formed SeaWorld Parks & Entertainment.

Fast Facts!

- SeaWorld Parks & Entertainment operates eight theme parks and four water parks across the United States.
- SeaWorld and Busch Gardens rescue teams have helped over 40,000 animals in the past fifty years.
- The SeaWorld and Busch Gardens Conservation Fund has donated about \$16.5 million and supported over 1,200 animal conservation projects across all seven continents.



Zoological interns worked as a part of the Clyde Barn team. This team manages the Highland Stables, home to two sheep paddocks, a cattle habitat, an owl habitat, and a photo area that allows guests to meet and take photos with the horses. The Clyde Barn team also cares for various bird species in the Lorikeet Glenn Aviary. Here guests can walk through and feed nectar to birds.

The issue within the zoological line of business we chose to address in our project was that many of our animals do not have habitats in the park, and we have limited staff to do consistent presentations. We also presented ideas to promote the Conservation Fund and encourage donations.

Summer Leadership Internship Program

Overview

The Summer Leadership Internship Program provides the opportunity for interns to gain critical work experience in various sectors of the theme park and hospitality industry. Interns also attended weekly seminars presented by park leaders in different lines of business in the park to allow for a greater understanding of how they all work together to operate the park.

Daily Responsibilities

Responsibilities and duties varied day to day depending on what you are assigned to do. Typical responsibilities included daily husbandry, preparing diets, cleaning habitats, and monitoring guest areas.

Every morning before the park opens, four Clydesdale horses are walked across the park from the Italy pasture to the Highland Stables where they are viewable by guests, and then they are walked back to their pasture at night when the park is closed.

Much of our day involved taking the Clydesdales to Clyde Photo, a photography location where guests can meet the horses and take photos with them. This is an enrichment experience for the horses, and we get to have conversations with people about our horses and other animals. This is a popular interactive experience for the guests.

General Opening Shift Schedule

- 6:00-8:00 Feed animals and clean horse pastures, walk horses to Highland Stables
- 8:00-10:00 Groom horses, clean sheep paddock, feed and clean other barn animals

Key Points:

- New signs for the park to promote rounding up for donations and to learn about the animals
- Introduce merchandise into the park that would donate portions to the Conservation Fund
- Advocate for new animal habitats to allow for more animals to be visible to guests



Multi-Use Habitat:

- A habitat that is big enough and built specifically for multiple animals to be able to live in.
- Provided dimensions for our animal with the largest habitat requirement, our Eurasian Eagle Owl
- Placed in a prime location that was visible and accessible to guests
- Themed and structured to match the Wild Reserve

Conclusion

I've been interested in working at Busch Gardens since I was in high school, and I'm so glad I had the opportunity to do so. This experience gave me a fantastic introduction to the zoological industry, and I feel fortunate that I got to work with animals I have gained experience caring for in classes at school.

Jobs

Interns were placed in various lines of business within the park including human resources, ride operations, finance, guest relations, and zoological operations. I was a zoological intern with the Clyde Barn team. Interns worked at least forty hours per week, any day of the week.



Seminars

Interns attended weekly seminars presented by different leaders in the park. Each week, leaders from different lines of business discussed how they operate in the park. The leaders also told their personal experiences working in the park and how they earned their positions.

Project

All interns completed a business case project, where they selected a business issue they came across while working in their roles and presented a solution to park leadership.

- 9:00-9:30 Park closes, clean all horse stalls, take trash out, prepare barn for the next day

On select nights- monitor animals during fireworks presentation

9:30-10:00 Walk horses back to Italy pasture, properly lock all gates, and check waters
